## Special Addition......a sweet story from Bob Jones

First of all, I want to apologize to Bob Jones, again, for losing this submission from him when I requested for Christmas traditions stories for the January Newsletter. He was the first person to send me a story, and I LOVED what he wrote. When I came to put the Newsletter together, I was not able to find his email. I emailed Bob (at the last minute) and asked him to resend his email, but, sadly, I didn't get it in time for January. Here it is......and, thanks so much for sharing, Bob

The Christmas season brings back many memories of Christmas at my grandparents. My grandparents were poor in some ways, and rich in others. They lived on a farm with almost 1,000 acres. Their house was shared with 6 kids, numerous cats, and several farm animals. Their house was heated with an old fashioned coal/wood stove in the living room. They had no indoor plumbing nor electric. Finally, one year before my Grandma died, my father convinced them to have electric put in the house. Grandma agreed, allowing only one overhead light socket in each room, plus one outlet in the living room. This outlet was for their radio so they could listen to "Marshall Dillon" on Saturday nites. Prior to electricity, Grandpa would remove the battery from their car to provide power for the radio each Saturday.

Getting the tree for Christmas was a real event. Everyone gathered there the Saturday prior to Christmas when Grandpa would get out an old fashioned sleigh, and hook up the horses. Then he would go into the house, and gather several lumps of coal from the Living Room stove, and place them into a special holder in the sleigh. Then he would cram all of us kids in to take a ride down to woods. We would all head out to scout out the "perfect Christmas tree", and then vote on which one to get. Then Grandpa would proceed to cut it, and we would load it into the sleigh. What kids couldn't fit into the sleigh had to walk back. Believe me, we all tried our best to get into the sleigh.

Once back at the house, Grandpa would make a "X" holder from wood, and attach it to the tree. Once done, all of the kids would gather in the living room to make decorations. We would make old fashioned "paper circle" garland, string popcorn, and each of us would make a special ornament for the tree. Once we were finished, Grandma would attach LIVE CANDLE HOLDERS. Yes, she used REAL CANDLES on the tree. By this time it was time to eat. The meal would often consist of freshly killed/plucked chickens, and fruits/potatoes from the "root cellar". Of course, there would always be loads of freshly made bakery items and jams.

Each Saturday morning, Grandma would do her baking for the week. Grandpa would get up at 4:40 am to start the fire in the wood/coal kitchen stove. By 5 am Grandma was busy starting to bake things-breads, rolls, cookies, etc. By the time she stopped nearly 4 hours later, the kitchen table would be wall to wall with yummies. The kitchen table could seat 12 people, so you can only imagine the quantity of baked goods. Breads were wrapped in cloth towels (Made by Grandma, from feed sacks). These same feed sacks made many dresses for the girls as well.

My Dad was one of 8 kids. When it came time for Christmas day, we were all so excited. We would

sing songs, watch Grandma light the candles on the tree, and just have the best time in the world. Each year Grandma always had home made things for EVERYONE. It still amazes me how she could find time to make all these things.

Other memories include Grandpa walking nearly a half mile away to get water from a well on a farm that had burned years ago. He said this water tasted better that the well located near the house. Many of us would stay overnight on Christmas Eve. We would sleep in the bedrooms upstairs where the only source of heat was from whatever would come up thru the door from downstairs. We slept on feather beds. If you don't know what they were, they were a real experience. Once you got in the feathers would instantly spread out to the sides, leaving little, if any, support. Of course the blankets on the beds were all made by Grandma too.

I still have a recording that my Dad made from one of the last Christmas times at Grandmas. On this recording, my Grandma sings a song about "How the praddies (potatoes) grow, and my brother and I singing "Jingle Bells". I listen to this recording each Christmas, and wouldn't be without it each year. These were some memories that I will never forget. I have tried to make each of my sons memories to share with their kids in the future.

This year, I am making a special present for my sons. They both often say how much they love some recordings that I made with my dad regarding his youth, and long life. He died shortly after his 90th birthday. I am so pleased to have these memories, in my Dad's voice. I am almost finished with something similar to record my life's memories for them.

BOOK Club



**Exodus Homes** 

Our charity for the 1st quarter of 2021 is supporting Exodus Homes. https://www.exodushomes.org/



Exodus Homes is a United Way agency that provides 73 beds of faith based supportive housing to Homeless men and women who are returning to the community from treatment centers and prison. They have a comprehensive array of services to meet their needs including housing, transportation, case management, vocational training, employment, leadership development and volunteer opportunities. The length of stay is individualized.

Exodus Homes is 75% self-supporting through their revenue generating vocational training program Exodus Works, and fees paid by residents after they are employed in the community. They are primarily operated by current and former residents, mostly in volunteer staff positions. Over the past 23 years they have demonstrated effectiveness in significantly reducing prison recidivism, neighborhood crime, and improving the local workforce for hard to employ people.

Members of Newcomers of Catawba Valley Charity can support Exodus Homes by hiring them for moving, landscaping, gutter cleaning, pressure washing, debris removal, hauling and other kinds of general labor.

They also need donated furniture and household accessories in good condition for their thrift store and donated vehicles for their transportation services. Donation pick up is free and tipping for their volunteer workers is appreciated. They have volunteer opportunities in their thrift store to help clean and measure items to post for sale online as well as work the cash register when the manager needs help.

You may call Exodus Works to schedule their workers or to ask for a pickup for your donation. Or you may as always send a check to our treasurer: Kathy Rozea at

From "How Hickory arrived at its confusing streets" by Kathryn Wellin in the Charlotte Observer's Catawba Neighbors section, Nov. 24, 2002:

"In the 1930s, Hickory's parameters and street systems expanded as three cities — Hickory, West Hickory and Highland — merged.

"In 1950, the city stepped in with a new street plan to tame the mishmash of dead-end and discontinuous roads that picked up blocks from their origin, four of the same-named roads per quadrant and mass confusion.

"The city hired John Parker, the first dean of UNC Chapel Hill's regional and city planning school, to unify the street names and addresses.

"By 1951, Parker had divided the city into four quadrants, N.E., N.W., S.E. and S.W., and numbered the streets starting at center city. The numbers increase moving away from Center Street and the railroad tracks, with the avenues running east to west, parallel to the tracks.

"Anything with a street in the name runs north-south. So First Street N.E. means you are one block northeast of Center Street.

"House numbers are also clues. The 15 in 1526 signifies that the nearest cross-street is 15th Street. Usually. The 26 means it's the 26th house on that 1500-block and on the right side of the street as you move from the center of town. Even-numbered houses fall on the right, odd-numbered on the left.

"Enter drives. Drives are winding thoroughfares that couldn't conform to life as a street or avenue. So Eighth Street Drive N.E. starts out north-south, like a street, at its closest to center city and then wends its way off the grid.

"The one concession is there are no mere drives — always street-drives and avenue-drives. So drives always begin east-west or north-south.


"'There is some logic behind it, even if it doesn't appear that way on the surface,' said assistant city manager Tom Carr."

## Updates on City of Hickory River Walk and City Walk

Thanks to avid walkers Dianne and Paige Straley, I get occasional updates and photos about the wonderful construction going on for River Walk and City Walk...

The long-awaited pedestrian bridge over 3rd Street in downtown opened this afternoon. It is a key link on City Walk and gives a gorgeous view of downtown's Union Square. Park your car downtown or the farmers market site and go walk it. With the bridge open, you now have a safe, easy walk or bike ride from 2nd Street NE (near the old Soup Kitchen), through downtown and ending at 9th Street NW. You can walk all the way to the LR campus by switching to the sidewalk along Main Avenue NE, which will allow you a closeup view of the roundabout construction on 2nd Ave. NE.

The entire project should be complete this spring.



<u>LEFT</u> Partially completed River Walk (Geitner Park) Elevated Walkway

Now connects to the Geitner asphalt trail. At one point we were able to see the dirt bike trail go beneath the River Walk elevated stretch.

RIGHT City Walk new Downtown Bridge over Third Street recently opened. Here is Paige Straley walking Ginger Straley and Lucy Hoover over the bridge. Park Downtown to check it out. City walk is about 80% complete. It

runs parallel to Main Ave from Lenoir-Rhyne University, through Downtown and ends at  $9^{th}$  St NW.

Marine Corps mission below has remained unchanged over the years. For the Catawba Valley Detachment of the MCL, what continues to evolve is the sheer number of community service projects we undertake.

The mission of the Marine Corps League is to **promote the interest** and to preserve traditions of the United States Marine Corps; strengthen the fraternity of Marines and their families; serve Marines, <u>FMF</u> Corpsmen, and FMF Chaplains who wear or who have worn the Eagle, Globe and Anchor; and foster the ideals of Americanism and patriotic volunteerism.

Their charitable efforts were extended beyond just the Toys for Tots Christmas gift campaign, to Boys & Girls State, Eagle Scouts, and Veterans Helping Veterans programs. In 2020,

- 1. We supported over 6300 Children (17,684 toys) during the Toys for Tots holiday gifting program funded 1 major Eagle Scout projects.
- 2. Assisted numerous veterans clothing, transition and emergency needs requests; specifically, through the annual Veteran's Stand Down at CVCC.
- 3. A regular Newcomers of Catawba Valley advocate and sponsor.
- 4. We sponsored a number of other organization's charitable efforts, such as Safe Harbor, Quilts of Valor, Cops for Tots and the S. Mountain Children's Home.
- 5. We are in our 3rd year of our Captain Don Smith Scholarship Foundation, which awarded \$2500 to 4 JROTC applicants from area high schools to ease the burden of college transition.
- 6. Because of COVID, we only performed a handful of flag and National Anthem ceremonies, veteran's funeral and patriotic recognitions.
- 7. This year we continue our focus on Grounds and Facilities renovations for our building that rest alongside the city's River Walk trail project.






