

# MEMORIAL DAY MAY 30, 2022



Memorial Day on May 30 conjures images of hamburgers, hot dogs, swimming pools, and summertime for many Americans. But the last Monday in May serves, most importantly, as a time to honor those who died while fighting in the U.S. Armed Forces. It's a holiday steeped in somber American history and tradition. The day actually began as "Decoration Day," following the Civil War, when mourners placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers. Yes, Memorial Day has also come to signify the "unofficial" start of summer, but let's remember the heroes who made it all possible.

May Day is the first day of May, long celebrated with various festivities, such as the crowning of the May queen, dancing around the Maypole, and, in recent years, often marked by labor parades and political demonstrations. May Day has its roots in ancient pagan festivals marking the beginning of summer. May Day is a celebration of the seasons changing as well as a day to celebrate workers' rights.





Cinco de Mayo, or the fifth of May, is a holiday that celebrates the date of the Mexican army's May 5, 1862, victory over France at the Battle of Puebla during the Franco-Mexican War. The day, which falls on Thursday, May 5 in 2022, is also known as Battle of Puebla Day. While it is a relatively minor holiday in Mexico, in the United States, Cinco de Mayo has evolved into a commemoration of Mexican culture and heritage, particularly in areas with large Mexican American populations.



#### Take a trip back in time...

#### Join us as we head out to Bunker Hill Covered Bridge and Murray's Mill in Catawba, NC

On Thursday, June 2<sup>nd</sup> we will meet up at the Hickory Airport (side) parking lot at 11:00 AM to begin our trek back in time. Our first stop will be Bunker Hill Covered Bridge, which is one of two <u>covered bridges</u> left in NC, and is possibly



the last <u>wooden bridge in the US with Haupt Truss construction.</u> It was built in 1895 by <u>Andrew Loretz Ramsour</u> (1817–1906) in Claremont, NC, and crosses Lyle Creek.

After having a good look at the bridge, we will each enjoy our own picnic lunch in the shaded area by the Lyle Creek where there are plenty of picnic tables to use.

From there, our caravan will continue to Murray's Mill, about 10 minutes down the road. Murray and Minges General Store is also on the property and open.





We have a guided tour scheduled for 1:00 PM. The tour takes about an hour. *Please note* there are stairs and there will be a lot of standing, but not much walking. The cost is \$10 for the tour, or \$7 entrance without the tour, and veterans are always free. Preserved intact are the 1913 mill itself, the 1890s Murray & Minges General store, the 1880s Wheathouse, used as an exhibit gallery, the 1913 John Murray House, furnished to the period, and numerous outbuildings. Run by three generations of the Murray Family who closed operations in 1967, the picturesque structures and surrounding land form the last milling complex in the county, meticulously preserved and interpreted by the Catawba County Historical Association since 1980 when restorations began.

If you are up for a walk, there are 3 trails that wind around the area. None are more than 1 mile. You may want to try these out after the tour!

To wrap up our day, we'll take advantage of the ice cream parlor in the General Store!

We should return to the Hickory Airport between 3:30 PM and 4:00 PM.

## Newcomers Show Up for The Outreach Center in Morganton.

First of all – you guys ROCK! Not only did you totally fill the Outreach's staff member's car with items for their thrift shop when she spoke at the General Meeting, we had 14 people show up at the Center on Tuesday April 26<sup>th</sup> in 3-hour shifts helping in a number of ways.

John and I were in the first shift and we were welcomed with open arms. This is one busy place! On Tuesdays people can come to the center and pick up a box of dry food (canned, bagged or boxed items), a box of produce, a bag of toiletries and a gallon of milk. Some pick up for up to 2 other families too.

The line of cars looked like the Customs line at the Cancun airport (or think Disney lines for some of the "best" rides.) We were told some people sleep in their cars the night before to get toward the front of the never-ending line!

For the first hour or so we helped In the dry food area. We basically pushed a shopping cart with an empty box in it around a large circle of pallets, placing an item from each of the pallets in our box. At the end of the circle, we dropped off the completed box with someone who sealed it up and added it to another pallet to be fork-lifted out to the car line. Then we'd pick up another empty box and off we'd go again.

From there we went out to the front line to take the place of another group whose shift was ending. As a car drove up they had a 1, 2 or 3 on the window showing how many families they were picking up for and we'd load their trunks and back seats (and sometimes their laps!) with boxes. This was a well-oiled machine and actually quite fun!

Some of our folks helped in the thrift shop instead of the food area and we also brought more donated items for that too.

#### So, special thanks to all of you who helped!

I'm planning on another collection for the thrift shop at the June General Meeting with another Tuesday later that month for anyone who'd like to go help again. I'll send a reminder in the June newsletter. In the meantime — if any of you want to go in smaller groups or even on your own — you can show up any Tuesday and tell them you are with Newcomers and they'll stick a name tag on you and show you what to do. Or go anytime Monday through Saturday between 9 am and 5 pm and help in the Thrift Shop. Again, just let them know you are with us! (And send me an email telling me about it!)

The book we will be discussing is The Rent Collector by Camron Wright:



#### The Run for the Roses

The Kentucky Derby is a horse race held annually in Louisville, Kentucky almost always on the first Saturday in May, capping the two-week-long Kentucky Derby Festival. The competition is a Grade I stakes race for three-year-old Thoroughbreds at a distance of one and a quarter miles at Churchill Downs. It is considered the grandest horse race in the world which lasts approximately 2 minutes and is often referred to as the "most thrilling 2 minutes in sports." This is one of the oldest horse races in the world and has been running every year since 1875. However, there have been two years when the race wasn't run in May. In 1945 during a wartime ban on horse-racing, and in 2020 when the race was delayed until September due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
